PASTOR'S REPORT

God provides! That theme, which guided our 2024 Stewardship Campaign, has proved to be true not only in our church finances, but truly in every aspect of our life together.

- Financially, God has indeed provided. We entered 2023 forecasting a budget deficit of some \$35,000. Through the faithful giving of our church, giving that was both generous and sacrificial, we ended the year on a better note than we ever imagined. We not only made up the deficit, we are blessed to enter 2024 with a surplus of some \$35,000. (Check the report of our Commitment Committee for the exact figures. And as you look at the report from that committee, join me in giving thanks for the faithful oversight they provide to our church finances and budget)
- Spiritually, God provided for APC in 2023. Our Faith Formation Classes provided weekly opportunities to study and grow in faith, those classes were for adults, children, and youth. Our youth class now meets every Sunday during the Faith Formation hour, and our children offerings are growing and meeting the needs of our littlest ones. We had Wednesday Bible Studies covering the Psalms in the summer and the Gospel of Matthew in the fall. PW met monthly with a faithful following of women, and we now have Time Out for Men on the same Wednesday the PW group meets. Our children had an exciting three weeks of summer camp at church, and the youth attended Conclaves and summer camp at Mo-Ranch.
- The worship life at APC is both reverent and joyful. Through the blessing of music, the liturgy that orders our services, the moments for children, our offerings and prayers, the preaching of God's word, and the celebration of the sacraments of communion and baptism, God is drawing our hearts together in very deep and meaningful ways.
- The fellowship life is a vital part of our church. Empty Nesters have dinners, Seniors and Friends have lunch, the Game Day provides fun and fellowship, the Ancient Mariners add a travel component that adds a measure of excitement. We have had numerous Wednesday night dinners that bring the whole church family together. The Live Nativity drew in great crowds both nights, and even the rain on Saturday night did not keep us from telling the story of the birth of Jesus. CLC brought to the church several fun Wacky Wednesdays, as well as the Trunk or Treat night which was a true celebration.
- God provided our church with many chances to share God's love through the mission life that was offered through our Witness and Outreach committee. We continued our support of HAAM, Seafarers, Family Promise, Presbyterian Children's Homes and Outreach, the Souper Bowl of Caring, and our special offerings. In the spring we learned about Sleep in Heavenly Peace, and now we not only actively support that ministry, we have opened our church parking lot once a month on Saturday morning to serve as the pick up site for bed deliveries.
- God has provided our church with a hard-working and diligent crew of folks who maintain our facilities. They have met the ongoing needs of our church campus with dedication and devotion. Many thanks are due to these hard-working friends.

I hope you can see why the theme "God provides" fits so well with the year we have shared together at APC. On a personal note, the phrase "God provides" means so much to both me and Julie. A year ago in February, February 6 to be exact, we arrived in Houston. We looked forward to the opportunity to join you all in ministry. What we have experienced has gone beyond anything we could have imagined. From day one we have been welcomed, supported, and encouraged in ministry. You have welcomed us into the life of the church, and even into your hearts. This new beginning has been such a rich and wonderful blessing. Our hearts are full of thanks and gratitude as we give thanks to God for calling us to serve with you and to share life with you. With glad hearts we joyfully proclaim...GOD PROVIDES!

The office of Deacons as set forth by Scripture is one of care, witness, and service after the example of Jesus. The duty of Deacons is to minister to those in need, to the sick, and those in distress.

The Board of Deacons consists of 12 Deacons who are charged with the care of the congregation. Each person has been assigned 10-14 APC families. Caring for families means reaching out by calls or cards, providing food, and transportation as needed. It is important to know your families, and for them to know you.

In 2023, as new Deacons came onboard, the first meeting in January was to distribute information and assign families to the new Deacons. It was discussed to try to provide a casserole for the freezer every three months. This went well for the first of the year, then the need was not there, so we discontinued. A reception for the outgoing interim pastor, Tom Koop was held February 5 with the Deacons helping supply finger foods. Again, on February 19, the Deacons stepped up and prepared a reception for our new pastor, Wayne Eberly and his wife Julie.

The Deacons participated with the Easter events by serving donuts and gathering in the fellowship hall after worship with activities for the children and families. A new member's class was held and Deacons were invited to attend a class. A memorial service for Kiernan Dulany's mother was held May 27 with Deacons providing finger foods for the reception afterwards. In June, Deacon meetings were moved to 2 pm for the summer. Summer time was quiet with Deacons continuing to check on families and updates were reported at monthly meetings. Deacon meetings resumed to meeting at 5 pm after Labor Day.

Tom Olson, a long-time charter member of APC passed away in July and a memorial service was held after worship September 17 with Deacons assisting with set-up and food preparation.

November 12 was the 40th anniversary celebration of APC in the fellowship hall with Deacons helping prepare foods and sending out invitations to former members.

In December, we met on the 14th to end the year of 2023 with updates on families, introducing new Deacons for 2024, 2025, and 2026. At this meeting, Steve Coleman accepted the role of Deacon Moderator. As I go off Deacon service, I am very much appreciative of all Deacons and APC families. I will always be a Deacon and ready to step up when needed. As I leave Deacon service, I leave each of the Deacons on the Board with many blessings and thanksgiving.

CREATIVE LEARNING CENTER 2023

CLC was originally two distinct programs: Children's Day Out beginning in 1985 and the Creative Learning Center in 1987. The two were combined in 2001 under the umbrella name of Creative Learning Center. Both were begun as a mission outreach ministry to our community and have served successfully in that capacity for more than 35 years. In order to provide continuity, the program was conducted off-site until the new building was completed following the 2001 fire. CLC faithfully adheres to its original Purpose Statement: to provide a Christian atmosphere for young children to learn, play, grow, and develop. As a result, our graduating students are highly recognized within HISD for kindergarten preparedness. ☐ Enrollment for 2023 was approximately 100, which is below capacity. The number of staff was at 19-21, which is about the same amount as last year. ☐ All CLC supplies are regularly shared with Sunday school classes and VBS as needed. ☐ Playground equipment is updated as needed and maintained by CLC. ☐ G.A.T.E. (God's Acre that Educates) is maintained by CLC. □ Classrooms are painted every 3 years (\$1750.00), floors stripped every 2 years (\$1900.00), and all furniture, toys, paper towels, soap, cleaners, and disinfectants are provided by CLC for the use of church and school. CHRISTIAN GROWTH AND NURTURE (CGN)

During 2023, Christian Growth and Nurture has witnessed tremendous attendance growth in the Christian education opportunities. We have increased numbers of members attending Faith Formation classes at all levels. We have several families who have returned from the aftermath of the pandemic and we welcomed new members in our classes.

<u>Adult Education</u>: Three classes are offered on Sunday mornings. Sermon Scripture Study with Shelley Craig, endeavors to dive deeper into the weekly worship scriptures. Attendance is both in-person and virtual. Doug Kennard leads his class with in-depth discussions as they explore various books related to the life and culture of the Bible's historical time periods. Christian Chat offers members a place to meet and discuss a variety of topics with church family. Attendance is steady and one class is making provisions for greater seating as they are outgrowing their classroom. Pastor Wayne has also offered Bible studies throughout the year.

<u>Creative Learning Center:</u> We support the Creative Learning Center with their Wacky Wednesday program offering fun and fellowship to children in our church, the school families, along with welcoming the community to attend. Creative Learning Center director Cathy Gerald will submit a separate detailed report.

Children's Education:

- *Nursery:* The nursery is available Sunday mornings during both the Faith Formation and worship hours. Two adult attendants care for the children during this time.
- *Preschoolers 3-4:* During the fall of 2023 we opened a Faith Formation class for 3- and 4-year-olds. Lisa Cruz, Charis Nees, and Lisa Clark have been leading classes. Katie Hannan will be joining us in 2024. Focus is on Bible stories. Students also join the K-5th grade class for music education during the final 15 minutes of class led by Debbie Becker, with David Gerald's accompaniment with his guitar. During December, the students participated in worship service by singing songs they had learned.
- *Elementary students:* Students are learning the Bible stories as we work our way through the *Laugh & Grow Bible for Kids*. Music Education is the last 15 minutes of the hour. Classes are led by, Bonnie Russell, Charis Nees, Lisa Stacy, and Terri Thomson. Students participated in a song presentation during December worship.
- Easter Celebration: Committee partnered with APC Deacons for the Sunday Morning Celebration. Our youth hid eggs for the children's egg hunts. Two crafts were available for everyone. Donuts with Deacons joined in the event as an opportunity for APC families to meet their deacons. The fellowship hall was full of fellowship and joy. Prior to entering worship, the youth helped release butterflies while the congregation watched with awe and amazement. A joyous morning for all.
- **Summer Camps:** Each summer we offer three weeks of amps for elementary-age children. Each week has Bible lessons that coordinate with one of three themes -Art, Music, and Science. A session of physical activities is planned each day. We sold out this year in less than 48 hours, filling all 30 slots for each week. The children enjoy engaging in all aspects of learning. Their joy is a blessing to our congregation.

Library: The APC library is open to all members and guests for browsing a variety of resources with the capability of checking out books. Marilyn Friedersdorf and Lisa Ryan have organized and maintained the library.

Youth: Mid-year the APC youth director was called in a different direction and we sent him off with gratitude and prayers in his new journey. Julie Eberly is currently leading a Faith Formation class at 9:30 on Sunday mornings. Attendance has been steady and the youth are engaging in their new study Bibles. They have participated in PYCC functions, Conclaves, Jr High Jubilee, and Sr High Youth Celebration.

FINANCE, STEWARDSHIP, AND PERSONNEL

FINANCE & STEWARDSHIP

Summary of 2023 Operating Results

Due to the continued generous support of the congregation and friends of Atascocita Presbyterian Church total contributions for 2023 were \$374,599.75. With operating expenses of \$337,479.86, APC ended the year with a positive cash flow of \$37,119.89.

Personnel ended the year under budget by \$5,621.17 due to the resignation of our Youth Director.

Finance ended the year over budget by (\$4,702.35) due to increases in the facilities insurance, online giving fees, software licenses, office supplies, and mortgage cost.

Facilities expenses were under budget by \$3,204.65 due to the use of money that had been allocated to the Facilities Capital Maintenance Fund.

Worship was under budget by \$120.62.

Christian Growth & Nurture was under budget by \$565.45.

The Mortgage balance at the end of 2023 was \$275,383.29, with a payoff date of 1/2033. The mortgage is an adjustable-rate loan with a three-year term.

The Mission committee was under budget by \$23.69.

Presbytery of New Covenant \$9,072.96 General Assembly Per Capita \$2,856.00 Local/National/International Support \$11,976.35

Support was given to Sleep in Heavenly Peace, Presbyterian Mission Agency, HAAM, Presbyterian Disaster Agency, Presbytery, CLC (Wacky Wednesday), Family Promise, Humble Area Charity Golf Tournament, Seafarer's Ministry, Houston Food Bank, Faith in Practice, Presbyterian Children's Home, and PTSD Foundation (Camp Hope). Total mission support provided by Atascocita Presbyterian Church including non-budgetary giving was \$29,924.46.

Total assets at the end of 2023 were \$95,765.58 and total liabilities of \$14,418.77. There was \$43,218.08 held in the Regions Bank checking account, \$50,822.26 with Morgan Stanley, and \$2,200 in online giving clearing with The Presbyterian Foundation. There was \$37,119.89 in the daily operating account and \$58,645.69 allocated to special funds. Examples of special funds include memorial, youth camps and mission, facilities capital maintenance, technology, Christian education and nurture, mission crafters, and other funds.

FACILITIES COMMITTEE

The committee kept busy in 2023 with a few major projects to tackle and various minor projects that kept the team occupied. We are fortunate to have several talented and caring members willing to share their time and energy to keep APC in good working order... and we are fortunate to have a congregation that is patient and understanding knowing that a facility of this age and size takes significant attention! Thank you!

Roof leaks and repair continue to be a reoccurring issue. Because of fund constraints, we choose to have a limited repair applied mainly to the junction area of the two buildings – old and new. The roofing company, Marlin Construction, worked with us on completing the job to our satisfaction as there were complications with the repair; this was a \$21,100 expenditure (April 2021).

Plumbing is another area of attention for us: Fixtures and valves (for toilets/urinals) are replaced as we learn of the problem. The water fountain was replaced with a bottle filling station. Leaks because of plugged kitchen floor drains are thought to be caused by bacterial buildup in the AC drain lines; they are being treated monthly to prevent clogs. The water supply line and electrical wiring for the water heater was rerouted as it interfered with the access to the HVAC unit located above the pantry.

Lighting for both the inside and the outside of the building received a good amount of the committee's time. Fluorescent lighting in the CLC classrooms was replaced with LED lighting. Outside security lights (on the building) were replaced with LED lights; parking lot lights were modified to LED lights.

Bathrooms (main hallway) were painted after sheetrock repairs were completed. New LED lighting was installed in the women's restroom with new diffusers. Emergency lighting was installed in both bathrooms.

Cleaning services continued to be an issue in 2023. After changing to Prestige in the fall of 2022, they provided unsatisfactory service. A good deal of time was spent searching for a new cleaning company; we've switched to Mint Condition.

A new AED device was installed in June; it is leased and maintained by the vendor. CenterPoint installed a new gas meter in July. Ceiling tiles stained by roof leaks were replaced. An UBS for Gateway (Pelican) controller was installed and has reduced the number of failures of the HVAC controller because of losing internet connection.

The sanctuary eastside air conditioning compressor was replaced in July after failing in June.

Gary and I wish to thank all of the people who have donated their time, talents, and financial donations toward helping keep APC in good working order and to improve it along the way.

The group also met during the summer for potluck, fellowship, and discussion of fun and interesting experiences.

Game Day for Grown-ups, under the leadership of Terri Parmerlee, met the last Thursday of the month for potluck and fun games including dominoes, bingo, trivia, and other fun.

Seniors and Friends Lunch Group, under the guidance of Bonnie Carr, met for lunch at various local restaurants once a month including Hacienda Los Arcos, Hippo Burgers, Tin Roof BBQ, Ling's Buffet, Spring Creek BBQ, Iguana Joe's, and The Catch.
